But we know what works. Providing housing and supportive services is the most effective way to prevent homelessness and address it quickly when it occurs. Communities across the country implementing these solutions continue to see successes every day.

SOLUTIONS THAT WORK

When communities work together effectively to deploy a range of solutions at scale for people who need them most, they see reductions in homelessness. That's why we support the following:

Expanding Access to Housing

- Invest in vouchers and other forms of rental assistance that expand access to affordable housing.
- Build and preserve permanent supportive housing to meet the growing need.
- Expand, strengthen, and enforce source-of-income protections to prevent housing discrimination.
- Incentivize and engage landlords to expand housing options for individuals transitioning out of homelessness.
- Expand and strengthen the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit to increase the supply of affordable housing.

Deepening Partnerships with Health Care and Other Systems

- Partner with hospitals, health and behavioral health centers, and other community-based health providers to provide supportive services co-located with housing.
- Leverage opportunities through Medicaid to unlock services that support housing stability.
- Offer respite care and nursing services for people who need them, especially for older adults and people with health and behavioral health needs.
- Partner with employers and Workforce Investment Boards to connect people to employment services and opportunities.

Responding to Homelessness with Dignity

- Scale and improve outreach and identification efforts that offer a range of supportive services.
- Provide safe interim housing options like hotels or shelter while permanent housing is being secured.
- Partner with community leaders, faith-based organizations, and people with lived expertise to champion humane, effective solutions.
- Improve coordinated entry systems by streamlining processes and modernizing systems to connect people to housing quickly and equitably.
- Expand access to Continuum of Care and other resources.

Strengthening Prevention Efforts

- Connect eligible households to rental assistance and other safety net services.
- Advocate for the right to counsel for tenants at risk of eviction.
- Partner with health and behavioral health systems to provide integrated services to identify and support patients at risk of homelessness.
- Coordinate with schools to prevent homelessness among students and support families.
- Work with the criminal legal system to prevent individuals from exiting incarceration into homelessness and address housing discrimination.
